# Guiding Principles: Gender Lens



All awarded grants must be intentionally designed to benefit women and girls.

Grantmaking with a gender lens does not automatically exclude programs that serve men and/or boys. Instead, organizations and programs must consider how their work addresses the challenges facing women and girls, strategically engaging participants of either or both genders.

Programming with a gender lens includes:

- Identified needs or systemic barriers faced by women and/or girls and a program designed to meet those needs.

# Guiding Principles: Reproductive Justice



Reproductive justice is more than access to abortion service. Reproductive justice contends that women's reproductive health is a basic human right.

The most marginalized in our country—including women of color, immigrant women, incarcerated women, women with disabilities, girls, young mothers and low-income women—face worse health outcomes, yet policies and services do not address these disparities.

What is Reproductive Justice?

- “Reproductive Justice is the human right to maintain personal bodily autonomy, have children, not have children, and parent the children we have in safe and sustainable communities.” - *SisterSong*
- “We believe Reproductive Justice exists when all people have the social, political and economic power and resources to make healthy decisions about our gender, bodies, sexuality and families for our selves and our communities.” - *Forward Together*

In 1994, “reproductive justice” was coined by a group of Black women working on intersecting issues of gender justice, reproductive health and rights and international development. This definition then and now is rooted in human rights and four core principles.

- The human right to have a child
- The human right to not have a child
- The human right to parent the children one has
- The human right to bodily autonomy and sexual expression

# Guiding Principles: Reproductive Justice



We would like to encourage organizations to take a holistic view of a woman's life—from prenatal options to senior needs—and understand that a woman's health impacts her family and, ultimately, her community.

We do not expect applicants to be a reproductive justice organization, but that they articulate their understanding of the importance of reproductive justice to the population they serve or are working to impact and how their work contributes.
